# ABOUT SUMMERCOLLAB

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SummerCollab partners with community based institutions and schools to light kids up about learning through extraordinary summer programs. Uniquely, we make precise capacity building investments in each of our partnering sites in the form of leadership coaching, specialized personnel, staff training, technology and curriculum. This ensures Collaborative Camps are equipped with the resources they need to implement best practices proven to transform educational outcomes for students.

In 2018, **we served 2,300 kids through 12 member camps** and helped deliver:

- Hands-on, expertly designed curriculum
- Ongoing assessment to track student needs and growth
- Targeted interventions that meet students' individual needs
- Access to expert teachers, exceptional college students, and other qualified individuals dedicated to reversing summer learning loss

3rd grade marks a crucial year in the lives of young learners. Until this point, students are learning how to read, but after third grade, they start reading to learn. Text-dependent learning becomes more prevalent across all subjects, and if a child struggles below grade level in literacy, their chances of catching up diminish rapidly.

This year SummerCollab introduced the Summer Literacy Corps, an AmeriCorps Program, dedicated to supporting growth in literacy during this critical time in kids' development. The Summer Literacy Corps' mission is to provide individualized and targeted literacy interventions to at least 40% of children, K-5, enrolled at SummerCollab member sites during the summer. Corps members, who are high-performing high school and college students, work one-on-one with students every day of the summer, reinforcing core competency areas, including vocabulary and comprehension.

As a result of the above, in 2018 we saw\*:



**86.2%** of campers reverse summer learning loss.

\*In keeping with national best practices, all data was calculated inclusive of all children, including those who experienced loss or stasis.



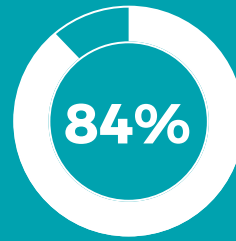

Percentage of kids who reversed summer learning loss



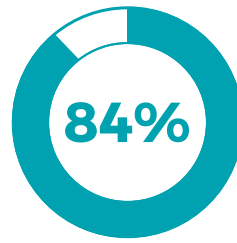

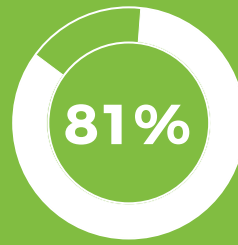
# BOYS & GIRLS CLUB AT EAST SIDE CHARTER SCHOOL

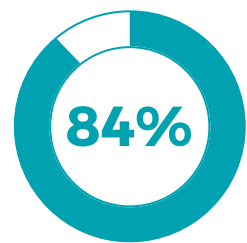
# CLARENCE FRAM BOYS & GIRLS CLUB

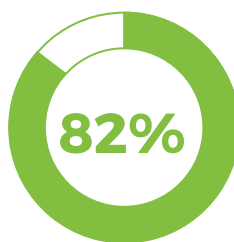

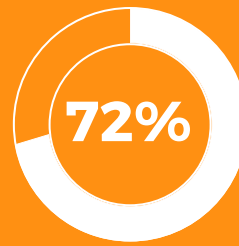




# WILLIAM “HICKS” ANDERSON COMMUNITY CENTER

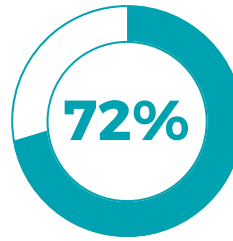

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Percentage of kids who reversed summer learning loss

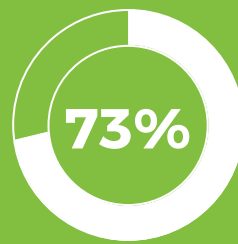

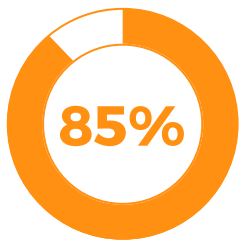

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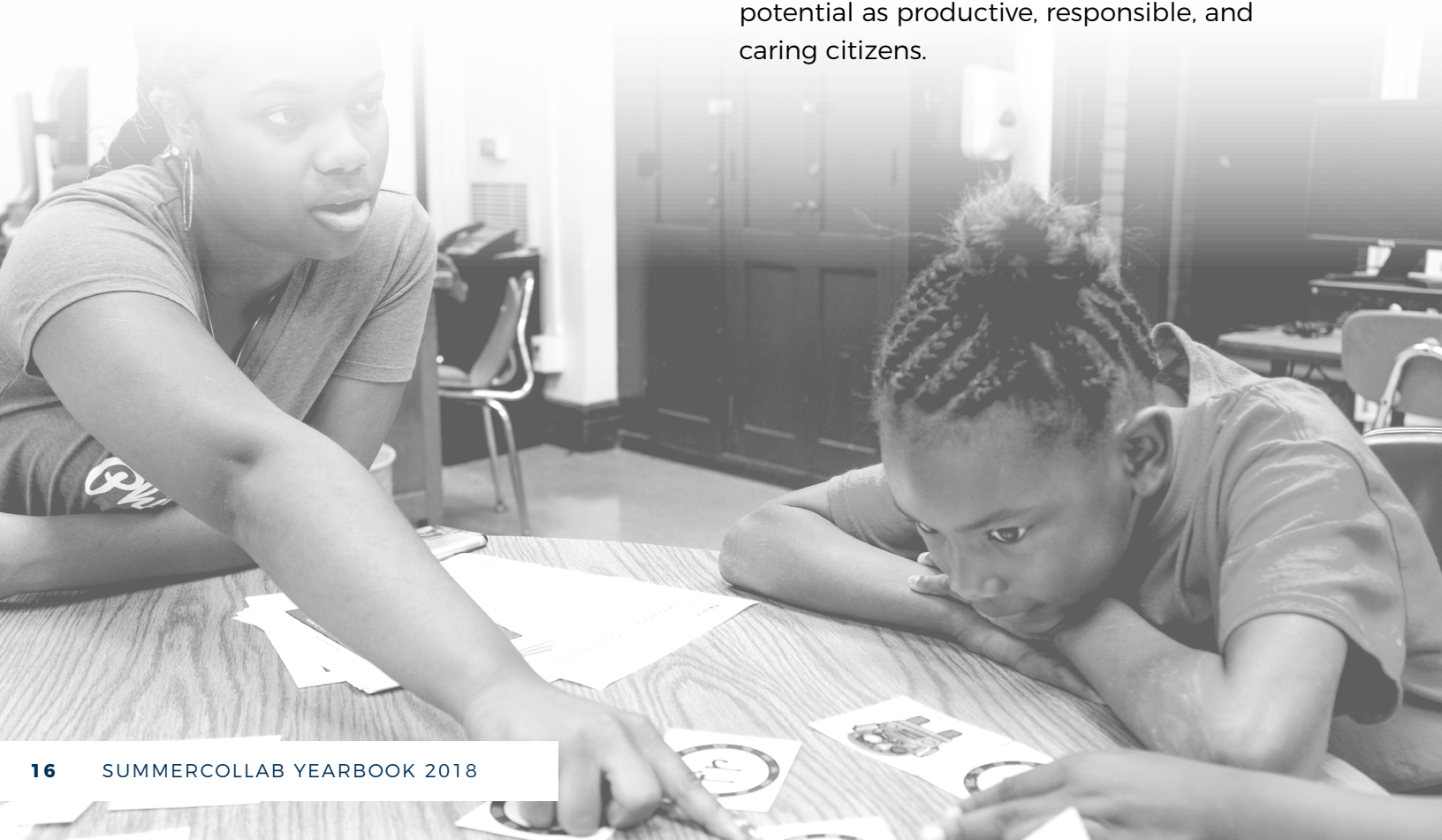
Percentage of

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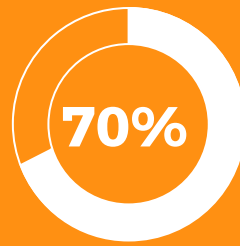




## URBANPROMISE - CAMP HOPE

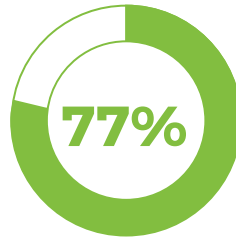

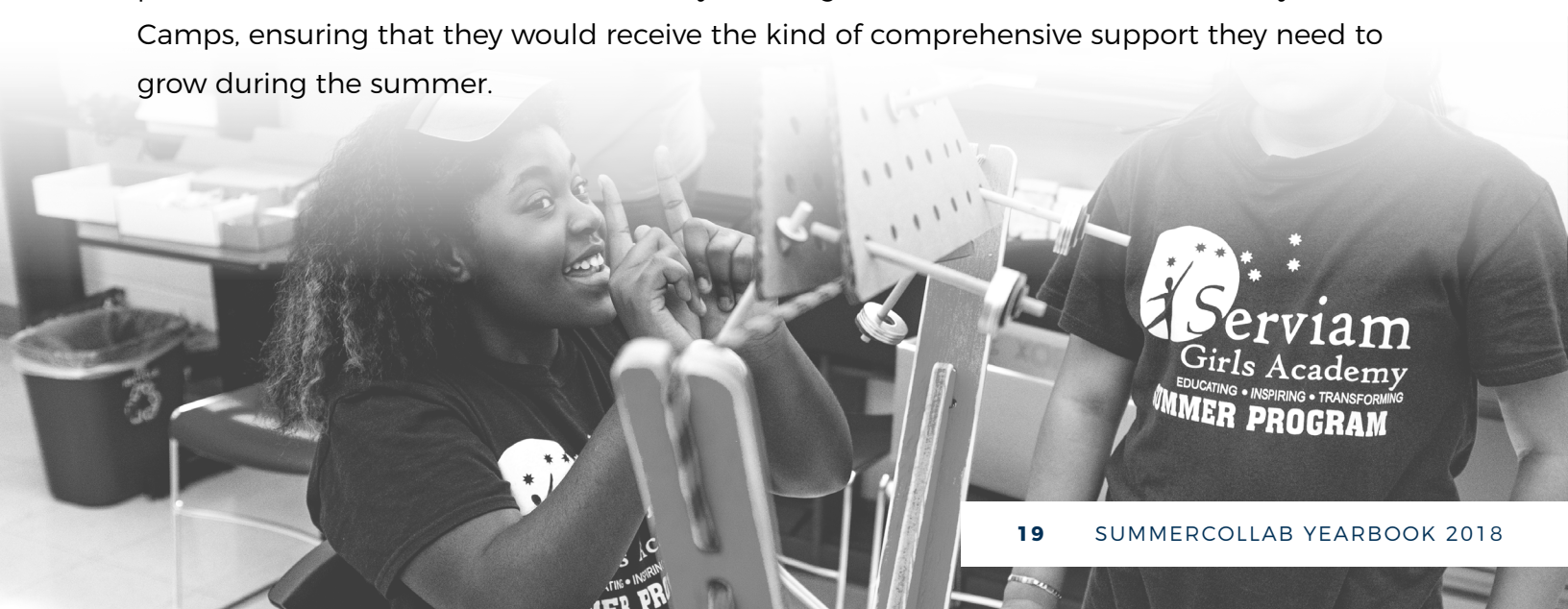
## TYLER'S CAMP

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2018 marked a momentous year for Tyler's Camp, SummerCollab's middle school academies. At Tyler's Camp, our campers, called Pathfinders, explore a range of subjects taught by leading experts in each field, including lacrosse, dance, coding, robotics, and more. Pathfinders also had the opportunity to participate in literacy classes, where they could reinforce key competencies, like reading comprehension and vocabulary, in a small-group setting.

Tyler's Camp was founded in memory of Tyler Brown, a student of Salesianum School, who exemplified commitments to scholarship, sportsmanship, openness and service during his life. It is with his example in mind that Tyler's Camp aims to create opportunities for its Pathfinders to wholeheartedly explore a diverse selection of subjects each summer.

- **700 Pathfinders** attended Tyler's Camps this summer from Boys & Girls Clubs of Delaware, La Esperanza Community Center, Freire Charter School, Great Oaks Charter School, Nativity Preparatory School, Kingswood Community Center, Hilltop Lutheran Neighborhood Center, William "Hicks" Anderson Community Center, Serviam Girls Academy, and the Walnut Street YMCA.
- **20+ strategic partners** devoted expertly-led programming to Pathfinders this summer, including Strive: How You Lead Matters, Microsoft, EXPLO, US Lacrosse, Coded by Kids, Wilmington Ballet Academy, Wilmington Children's Chorus, Ground Up Computer Science, and more.
- **5 schools** dedicated their facilities to serve as Tyler's Camp campuses across the state of Delaware. They include Sussex Academy, Salesianum School, McCullough Middle School, Castle Hills Elementary School, and Stanton Middle School.
- **2 school districts**, Red Clay Consolidated School District and Colonial School District, partnered with SummerCollab to identify their highest-needs students to attend Tyler's Camps, ensuring that they would receive the kind of comprehensive support they need to grow during the summer.





## LOOKING FORWARD

Through our passion, dedication, and commitment to our kids, we will continue to not only reverse summer learning loss, but drive significant academic and developmental gains for our kids during the summer.

### IN 2019 WE WILL:

- Ally with Member Camps and Tyler's Camps to support 3,000 K-8 students.
- Serve 40% of all campers with targeted literacy support through our AmeriCorps Summer Literacy Corps
- Refine and expand our groundbreaking data sharing agreement with local school districts, enabling us to track our students throughout the school year and measure the longitudinal impact of our programming
- Provide camp leaders and staff with ongoing professional development to drive systemic improvements in positive behavior systems and trauma-informed care, camp culture, and personalized learning
- Support strategic planning, data analytics, and institution of action steps to help each agency identify growth areas and implement best practices

### PROJECTED RESULTS:

- 86% of campers will reverse summer learning loss
- 67% of campers will make academic gains
- 20% of our 3rd graders will make summer gains that bring them to grade level reading
